THE Ampang Jaya Municipal
Council (MPA) is checking on the
status of a narrow strip of land in
Taman Tun Abdul Razak, Ampang
after it was once again closed off
with metal fencing.

The land between two bungalows along Jalan 1 is the entrance
to a popular hiking trail known as
Dukit Kembara.

The trail leads hikers to an old
disused reservoir surrounded by
the Ampang forest reserve.

StarMetro reported in August
that the access route to the trail
was illegally closed off by a group
of residents citing safety concerns.
The fence was removed by MPAJ
following complaints.

However, on Oct 11, it was
discovered that the route was
again fenced up, this time with a
signboard stating that the land
helonged to a private developer.
MPAJ press relations officer
Norhayati Ahmad said they were
in the midst of determining whether
it is state land or private land.

"MPAJ did not order the closure

and we are communicating with
the parties involved," she said.
A recent check showed that the
fence had been removed and disposed of at an abandoned house

Norhayati confirmed that the council had not removed the

Regular hiker and Bukit Indah resident Natasha Fernz, 40, said there was no reason to fence up the access route.

"If this is done for safety rea-sons, then the whole area would have to be fenced up. There are also many routes to go up the hill. "This is a popular trail because it is not too strenuous a hike and a

scenic route.
"A lot of retirees tend to hike it

daily and the route is also maintained by them," she said.
Senior hiker Sunny Low, 63, said the hikers hoped that the status of the access route would be sorted out soon.

"A group of senior hikers maintain the trail, even go so far as to

put up safety ropes and clearing any debris," he said, adding that he had been hiking there regularly for the past nine years. Low said several hikers would be sending a formal letter to MPAJ and the Selangor Forestry Department about the issue.
